What a strange time we are all living
through right now! So much is uncertain,
but here at PPL I am happy to say we are certain of two constants.

First and foremost, YOU! We would not be able to continue to serve Rhode Islanders during this time without you— plain and simple. **You** make our work possible — and I am more grateful than I can ever express.

Our amazing PPL staff is the other constant! I'm pleased to tell you that we have been able to keep everyone working — from home — since mid-March.

PPL has continued to do what we do best virtually! We are adapting, innovating and providing our programs and services (and even some new offerings) remotely. We are also partnering and collaborating with other libraries and community organizations to expand our reach and ensure that all Rhode Islanders have access to our resources, especially those who need them the most.

An example of this is the RI COVID-19 Archive, a joint project with the RI Historical Society, launched in mid-April to document our shared experiences during this time. (See more about this in this newsletter.) We also just concluded a completely virtual series of programs entitled "Adaptive Practices: Six Artists Redefine Isolation and Distraction" involving PPL's six Creative Fellows. The project was so well received that we are now working on ways to build on it.

Finally, our Education team has achieved unprecedented success transitioning nearly all of our face-to-face classes and services to online/distance learning. Within the first six weeks, our adult and teen services staff were able to serve 560 students in our adult ESL, GED, Citizenship and technology classes, our teen tech classes, and our virtual Tech Hub for adult education.

Thank you for believing in PPL and investing in our work — especially now. We miss you and can't wait to see you at the Library again! Wishing you and yours health.

## A Special Distance Learning Success Story


All of PPL's education classes have transitioned to remote learning using various technology tools. We're finding that our teachers and students are adapting very well! This distance learning success story was shared by our ESL teacher Doug Norris... and made

possible by PPL supporters like you!

Thin, a Cambodian woman, rarely missed a class when she participated in the twiceweekly adult intermediate ESL program at Auburn Library in Cranston. There, she



became familiar with Newsela, an online newspaper and website that offers stories, quizzes, vocabulary activities and writing prompts, all at a range of reading



levels. As the class transitioned to distance learning because of self-isolation practices necessitated by the coronavirus, a Newsela class was created, and Thin is easily its most enthusiastic student. She has completed

all 20 of the assigned readings and has read 20 additional articles on her own. She has also completed 31 quizzes and researched 168 vocabulary words, dedicating nearly 27 hours of practice time to the website. Additionally, Thin participates in the twice-weekly group email class, using Google Docs to submit her homework, which includes grammar activities, paragraphwriting prompts, surveys, and links to explore various topics online (including English practice, reading options, arts and culture, travel, food, etc.).
